The application process was extended due to an injunction granted to the Islamic Schools. The parents should begin finding out if they were awarded a voucher this week. There were over 274,000 applications and funding for 70,000.

Accreditation

Our accreditation visit went well, and we received an exceptional report. We only received 1 major recommendation. I reached out to the ACSI Accreditation Division Leader and requested that a review be conducted on our report as I felt that we needed to have more recommendations based on the areas that we identified as a school for improvement. Early Childhood

Teachers have assessed each child in preparation for Spring Parent/Teacher Conferences during the week of April 27th

Academic:

Math – Students are practicing Greater than/Less than. Also, they are using strategies to solve simple subtraction story problems.

Reading – Students are creating CVC words and word families using short vowel sounds. They are also introducing sensory words or adjectives to describe nouns.

Moustronaut by Mark Kelly and Someone is Eating the Sun, an Eclipse Story by Ruth A. Sonneborn as well as other space-themed books are the focus of the class.

Spiritual- Students walked through the Journey to Easter study including a moment in which the teachers showed how they serve like Jesus by washing the students' feet. Each day the classes opened one or two Resurrection Eggs and discussed the part of the Easter story in the Bible represented by the object inside.

Bible Verse: "Be kind and tender to one another. Forgive each other, just as God forgave you because of what Christ has done." Ephesians 4:32

Social Studies - Students had a wonderful week growing together as a class while exploring the spring gardening and growth theme. Farm Day was the culminating highlight on Friday, April 10th. The children planted watermelon seeds, made little sprout houses and started sprouting beans, made butter, and even learned how to milk a pretend cow.

Science- Space and Exploration themes

Elementary Spiritual

Chapel has focused on the Easter story. We had a beautiful all school chapel where elementary students sang and secondary students read passages from the bible. Our secondary worship team lead praise songs. Mr. Abbe gave a message that all participated in. Kinder students often answered the questions he posed. Several students were baptized over the Easter weekend.

Academics

Students completed Iowa testing. Honor roll for 3rd quarter was given. Qualifying 4th and 5th grade students were invited to join NEHS. 41 students completed the applications and will be invited to NEHS. Teachers are focusing on helping students to continue to put forth their best efforts in academics as we finish the school year.

Extra-Curricular

2nd grade went to Crowe's Nest Farm. They have been reading Charlotte's Webb and enjoyed connecting concepts they had read about to the farm. 1st and 2nd grade performed an Easter Musical. The message was strong and the students did an amazing job. 4th grade took a field trip to the Bob Bullock museum. They connected the lessons from class to the artifacts at the museum. 5th grade students have been participating in Soccer and Track.

Middle School Recharge was a blast. The event, “Louder than Words”, took place March 23rd. Students enjoyed a full day of outdoor games, crafts, breakout sessions and large group sessions. Dakota Abbe was the speaker and focused on how our actions should reflect the love of Christ. Praise and worship was led by the Fair Family band. Student surveys revealed students enjoyed the day.

Academic

RRCA 8th Grade students toured Washington DC, March 30-April 2nd. There were about 30 students that attended this trip. The trip had a full itinerary, covering 4-6 miles per day for four days, which included seeing the Lincoln, Jefferson, Eisenhower and Roosevelt Memorials, Vietnam Veteran’s Memorial, The Holocaust Museum, Bible Museum and American History Smithsonian and Mt. Vernon. One emotional highlight was visiting Arlington Cemetery where the group visited the graveside of one of the students’ grandparents. A wreath was placed at the grave featuring red, white and blue flowers and a ribbon banner with Round Rock Christian Academy. Students also participated in a service project in which they prepared 3,000 meals of apple cinnamon oatmeal.

The National Honor Society Induction Ceremony was held on Monday, April 6th. The ceremony honored the accomplishments of 28 new inductees. Mrs. Cermak was the guest speaker and spoke about the four pillars of character of NHS.

Extra-Curricular

Student-Council hosted Winter Formal, February 7th at Avery Ranch Clubhouse. This event was well attended. The theme was Hollywood and students. Students entered the venue on the red carpet, took advantage of the photo booth and enjoyed all the line-dancing songs played by the DJ.

RRCA Ambassadors hosted kindness week, March 2nd-6th. Each day students were to dress in a theme which modeled kindness and the ambassadors hosted a school wide activity each day, such as writing a kind note to a teacher, posting in the hallway something kind someone has done, and treating the students to a hot chocolate bar.

Crusaders have represented at the TAPPS State Contests.

The Academic and Speech Team are the 4A TAPPS State Champions! This year RRCA placed 1st in Sweepstakes at the 18 event Academic, Speech & Debate Tournament, being named as the top Speech school and top Debate school, and 2nd overall in academic events.

The Art team took third place overall.

The High Call Choir brought home the 4A state vocal championship. The choir excelled in the competition, finishing as the highest rated choir in the entire state from all divisions (1A-6A) to finish our sixth straight state championship.

College and Career

Throughout February and March, students participated in a variety of career exploration and college readiness events. On February 2nd, a Middle School Career Chapel featured five participants who shared about their careers, including how God led them to their professions, the education required, and how they are serving Him through their work. On February 11th, Hardin-Simmons University presented to juniors and seniors, followed by a Q&A session, and on February 19th, The University of Texas offered a similar presentation and discussion. High School Career Day took place on February 25th, with over 40 presenters representing 10 different career fields engaging students and answering questions. College presentations continued with Colorado Christian University on March 5th and Austin Christian University on March 25th, both including Q&A sessions for juniors and seniors. On March 31st, ACC introduced its Dual Credit Program to sophomores, and on April 1st, 20 juniors participated in the SAT School Day.

Athletics

As April winds down, our spring sports season is nearing its conclusion, and it has been an exciting and encouraging time across our programs.

At the high school level, the baseball team currently holds a 6–12 overall record (1–4 in district) with three games remaining in the season. The softball team is having an outstanding inaugural season, posting a 6–3 overall record and a 5–2 district record. They are currently in second place, which secures a playoff berth in their very first year of competition—an impressive accomplishment.

Our high school track team will compete in the district meet on Thursday, April 16, in New Braunfels. The golf team will follow with their district tournament on Monday, April 20, at Plum Creek Golf Course in Kyle. In addition, our three high school tennis players represented the school well at the district tournament on March 30.

At the junior high and middle school levels, the baseball team is off to a strong start with a 2–0 record. The softball team has played one game so far, and their tournament this past weekend was unfortunately canceled due to weather. Our 5th–8th grade soccer teams continue to make great progress this season and will compete in their end-of-season tournament beginning April 27.

We also have individual athletes competing this week, including one junior high boys golfer and one 6th grade girls' tennis player, who will participate in tournaments on April 14 and April 18.

We are proud of the effort, growth, and representation shown by all our student-athletes this spring and look forward to a strong finish to the season.
