The senior class continued the meaningful tradition of Senior-Led Chapel on April 20. Senior members of the praise band led the student body in worship, including a special song written and performed by one of the seniors.

Three seniors shared personal testimonies, reflecting on how God has used hardships, challenges, and moments of pride to strengthen their faith and deepen their relationship with Him. Their messages were authentic, encouraging, and impactful for students across all grade levels.

The chapel concluded with a senior panel discussion during which students answered questions about making the most of the high school experience. Topics ranged from managing academic and extracurricular commitments to navigating social challenges and building meaningful relationships. The seniors offered practical wisdom and Christ-centered encouragement as they reflected on lessons learned throughout their time at RRCA.

Academics

On Saturday, May 16, the school celebrated Commencement and honored the accomplishments of the 33 members of the graduating Class of 2026. This exceptional group of students distinguished themselves through achievements in academics, fine arts, athletics, and a wide range of extracurricular activities.

Among the graduates were members of the TAPPS 4A State Champion Choir and the TAPPS 4A State Champion Speech and Academic Team. Ten members of the graduating class earned recognition as TAPPS Academic All-State honorees. The class also includes students who received high honors distinctions in fine arts, choir, speech and debate, and track and field.

The Class of 2026 was led academically by Valedictorian Madison Aranda and Salutatorian Joey Berenguel. The commencement address was delivered by retired Colonel Scott Hoffman, who challenged graduates to lead with character, purpose, and faith as they begin the next chapter of their journeys.

Extra-Curricular

Secondary students showcased their artistic talents during the annual Art Show on April 10. The event featured an impressive collection of student artwork representing a variety of media and techniques. A special highlight of the evening was the Senior Portfolio Exhibit, where graduating seniors displayed collections of work that reflected their artistic growth, creativity, and dedication throughout their high school years.

Prom was held on April 18 at the Owen House in Round Rock. Students enjoyed a memorable evening as they walked the red carpet at this year's Hollywood-themed event. The celebration included Kona Ice, a coffee truck, and an assortment of desserts. Students also had opportunities to win a variety of prizes, with a laptop serving as the grand prize. The evening concluded with the crowning of the Prom King, Jake Brown, and Prom Queen, Stella Carter, a highlight of the event and a memorable moment for the senior class.

The school continued its long-standing tradition of celebrating the completion of middle school with the annual 8th Grade Dinner. The 61 members of the graduating class gathered at Blue Corn Harvest to enjoy a special evening of fellowship. Following the dinner, students attended a parent-sponsored celebration at Austin's Park and Pizza, where they enjoyed time together and commemorated this important milestone before transitioning to high school.

College and Career

The end of the year focused on College Board AP Testing. We had 61 students take AP tests in the following areas: World History, US History, Spanish, English Literature, English Language, Calculus AB, and Calculus BC. Scores will be released on July 6th.

Over the year, we have hosted 17 college/university admissions representatives for presentations and Q&A sessions. We have also made our first trip to a post-secondary institution (Texas State Technical) and hope to add more next year. In addition, we hosted 2 career assemblies and 1 career day, with over 50 presenters participating across 10 different career paths. Shout out to our wonderful parents and community members that volunteered their time!

Athletics

The spring athletic season concluded with significant accomplishments across our high school and junior high programs, highlighted by playoff appearances, individual honors, and continued growth in several sports.

The high school baseball team finished the season with a 10-13 overall record and a 4-4 district record, earning a berth in the TAPPS playoffs. The Crusaders defeated John Paul II to secure the first baseball playoff victory in program history and advanced to the TAPPS Area Playoff, where they competed well and finished as Area Finalists. The team also excelled in the classroom, with Ethan Leverenz and Austin Chamblee being named Academic All-State.

In its inaugural season, the high school softball team enjoyed tremendous success, finishing second in district with a 7-2 district record and an 8-4 overall record. The Lady Crusaders earned a spot in the TAPPS Area Playoff and concluded their historic first season as Area Finalists. Three softball players were recognized as Academic All-State selections: Alexa Stout, Stella Carter, and Kylie Hanson.

The high school track and field team saw three athletes advance from the district meet to the TAPPS Regional Championships. Mia Kropenwicki qualified in the High Jump, Discus and 100m Hurdles, Jayden Njoroge qualified in the 100m Dash, and Josiah Headley qualified in the 110m Hurdles. All three athletes finished in the top four at the regional meet to earn qualification to the TAPPS State Championships. At the state meet, Mia Kropenwicki placed 2nd in High Jump and 4th in the 100m Hurdles, Jayden Njoroge finished 7th in the 100m Dash, and Josiah Headley finished 8th in the 110m Hurdles. All three athletes were also recognized as Academic All-State honorees.

At the junior high level, all three 5th-8th grade soccer teams had successful seasons. The 5th/6th grade soccer team, composed primarily of fifth-grade students, captured the CAPPS 5A Soccer Tournament Championship after entering the tournament as the fourth seed.

The 5th-8th grade track teams competed well at the CAPPS Track and Field Championships and continued to demonstrate growth and development throughout the season.

The junior high baseball team finished the season with a 2-2-1 record, while the junior high softball team concluded with a 2-2 record. Both programs were impacted by spring weather conditions that resulted in several game and tournament cancellations that could not be rescheduled.

Overall, the spring season was marked by competitive success, strong academic achievement, postseason appearances, and continued development across all levels of the athletic program. We are grateful for the dedication of our student-athletes, coaches, parents, and supporters who contributed to another outstanding year of Crusader athletics.
